Mitsubishi Ichigokan Museum, Tokyo 🕹 Restaurants

Meiji Seimei Kan

Said to be the finest piece of Classical-style architecture, Meiji Seimei Kan was the first building constructed in the Showa period that has been designated as an Important Cultural Property. Its construction was completed in 1934. Main rooms that remind you of historic events such as the conference room which was used for the Allied Council for Japan meetings after World War II are worth visiting.

Wadakura **Fountain Park**



This park was constructed in 1961 to commemorate the wedding of the Crown Prince at that time. The large fountain was later renovated. 


The Industry Club of Japan Hall



Tokyo Kotsu Kaikan




A large complex building with a revolving restaurant situated at 55 meters above ground. The terrace on the third floor commands a view of Tokaido Shinkansen up close—a perfect spot for train lovers! Antenna shops from all over Japan are also available.

Hyakunin-Bansho Guardhouse

Over 45 meters long north to south, Hyakunin-Bansho was the largest guardhouse in Edo Castle. Four squads of the Teppo Hyakuningumi (a hundred-men firearms troop) took turns guarding the castle. This guardhouse



is called "Hyakunin-Bansho" because a hundred security guards were stationed here day and night.



Fujimi-yagura (Mt. Fuji-view Keep)

This turret is also called "Happo-shomen-no-yagura (all-front-facing tower)" because the tower looks the same from all angles and positions. It's a key structure in Edo Castle, and served as the castle keep after the Tenshukaku main tower was lost to fire in 1657.

Site of the Matsu no Oroka Corridor

It was in this very corridor that the Matsu-no-Roka Attack—a historical incident featured in the movie Chushingura—took place. This grand corridor was lined with sliding doors that were painted with pine trees. It was the second longest corridor in Honmaru palace, at 19 meters long to the west, 31 meters long to the north, and 5 meters wide, forming a "L" shape.





& Restrooms Tenshudai (Remains of the main tower)

Tenshukaku main tower was once the symbol of shogun's power. After the tower was lost to the great fire in 1657, its base was reconstructed but not the tower itself. A stone wall structure of the main tower remains to this day.









East Gardens of the Imperial Palace Ote-mon Gate

This gate was the front gate to Edo Castle. Once you enter the Ote-mon Gate, you come into an enclosed square called "masugata." which served to hold back invading enemies. Surrounding white walls have holes called "hazama,"

through which defending soldiers fired guns.





Sannomaru Shozokan

(The Museum of the Imperial Collections)

Restrooms

The museum owns about 6,000 pieces of invaluable documents, paintings, works of calligraphy, artifacts, and more that have been passed down through generations in the Imperial Household. The Japanese

Government opened it to the public in 1989 and the new facility was unveiled in 2024.

Suwa no Chaya Tea House

Originally built in the times of 11th shogun Ienari, this tea house was relocated from Fukiage Gardens to its current location in 1968. The elegant, traditional tea house-style structure is a 1912 reconstruction of the original building. Visitors can enjoy looking at the tea

house from outside. From mid-April to June every year, a wonderful view of vivid-colored azaleas and the tea house entertain visitors' eyes.






Soto Sakurada-mon Gate

This is where the Sakuradamon Incident—the assassination of Chief Minister Ii Naosuke by ronin samurai of the Mito Domain—took place. As the starting point of the Odawara Kaido trade route, the gate is also called Odawara-guchi. Masugata—a defensive structure against enemy invasion—still remains completely intact at this invaluable gate.










Yasukuni-jinja Shrine



Founded in 1869 on the order of Emperor Meiji, this Shinto shrine is dedicated to those who died in battle from the end of the Edo period until World War II. There is a sample cherry tree that the Japan Meteorological Agency designated for Tokyo. The shrine has also been

a famous spot to see cherry blossoms since ancient times.

Statues of Oyama lwao & Shinagawa Yajiro

Oyama Iwao served as Commander-in-Chief of the Japanese Army in the Russo-Japanese War, and the first Minister of Army. Shinagawa Yajiro was a former feudal retainer of the Choshu Domain, and successively held key posts in the Meiji Government. This Kudanzaka Park is small, but packed with many highlights.

Ushigome Mitsuke Stone Wall

This stone wall was built when the outer moats of Edo Castle were completed in 1636. Today, you can see parts of the stone wall on both sides of the bridge. It's one of the spots around the remains of the outer moats where you can best get a glimpse of what the castle looked like in the past.

Tokyo Daijingu Shrine

Founded in 1880. This shrine worships the deities that are enshrined at Ise Jingu, and is affectionately called "Oise-sama in Tokyo." It's also known as a shrine that established Shinto wedding rituals. A visit to the shrine will bring you luck in finding love.

Bansho Shirabesho is a Western studies research institute established by the shogunate government in an urgent effort to introduce Western military technology following Perry's arrival in Japan. After the Meiji Restoration, its name was changed to Daigaku

Tavasu-mon Gate

There's a slope up to 10 degrees at the Tayasu-mon Gate entrance

Tayasu-mon Gate is located at the entrance to Kitanomaru National Garden. Back in the Edo period, the Kitanomaru corner of Edo Castle was home to the residences of Lady Kasuga and other members of the shogun family. Today, the park is home to an art

museum and other cultural facilities, and welcomes visitors.



Kanda Myoujin Shrine



The 1300 year old shrine that symbolizes the atmosphere of Kanda has been revered as the local guardian deity by all people of Edo including shoguns, common people, and everyone in between; and it is visited by many worshipers to this day. The stone stairs of Myoujin Otokozaka are a great photo spot.

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Zenigata Heiji Monument

EDO Culture Complex "EDOCCO"

The cultural exchange center, EDOCCO, has a café and souvenir shop. It also offers hands-on experiences of traditional culture.









Hijiribashi Bridge

This beautiful bridge with magnificent arches was built as part of the reconstruction project following the Great Kanto Earthquake of 1923, and became a new must-see spot in Tokyo at that time. It is made with steel and concrete and measuring 92m long and 22m wide. "Hijiribashi"

means "bridging between two holy sites on both banks."

Otahime Inari-iinia Shrine

In the Muromachi period, Ota Dokan built Edo Castle to deter the advances of the Chiba Clan who had territory on the Boso Peninsula. Displaying an expression of

gratitude upon his daughter's restored health after sickness, he built Otahime Inari-jinja Shrine as a branch shrine of Kyoto's Imoarai Inari-jinja Shrine.



Natsume Soseki Monument

Natsume Soseki studied here at Kinka Elementary School (current Municipal Ochanomizu Elementary School). A quote from his first piece of work, I Am a Cat, is carved on the commemorative monument.


Chiyoda City is right here!
